



1. The Books of the Bible – Library...



The Bible is a <u>Library</u> of 66 books that tells a single story of God's interaction with people. Its purpose is to teach us what <u>God</u> has done, is doing and how we can be a part of it.



- 2. Genesis 1-11 Presents the plot for the entire story of human history.
- 3. Genesis 1 God creates order from chaos. God's word for His order is "good"

Environment

<u>Inhabitants</u>

Day 1 − <u>Light</u> — Day 4 − <u>Sun</u>, Moon, <u>Stars</u>

Day 2 – <u>Sky</u> from <u>Waters</u> — Day 5 – <u>Living</u> creatures in sky/water

Day 3 − Ground and Plants → Day 6 − Land-dwelling creatures

Day 7 - Order and Rest



4. The Downward Spiral

a. The Garden: <u>Good</u> is defined by <u>God</u>. (Genesis 2)

*Genesis 1:26-27 – God created man to join in His mission

b. The Fall: Evil was introduced by <u>humans</u>. (Genesis 3)

* The tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil was test/choice for Adam and Eve.

"Will you be a part of my plan? - check <u>yes</u> or <u>no</u>."

Banishment 1: God protects His good creation. (Genesis 3:21-24)

c. The Murder: Human sin brings chaos (evil) (Genesis 4:1-9)

Banishment 2: God restores <u>order</u> (good) (Genesis 4:10-16, 25-26)

d. The Nephilim: Human sin brings chaos (evil) (Genesis 6:1-8)

Banishment 3: God restores <u>order</u> (good) (Genesis 6:9-9:28)

e. The Tower: Human sin breeds <u>rebellion</u> (chaos/evil) (Genesis 11:1-4)

Banishment 4: God <u>restores</u> His ordered (good) plan (Genesis 11:5-9)

That God is so persistent suggests there is a <u>purpose</u> for God's order.

- 2. Gen 12 The call of <u>Abram</u> (Gen 12:1-3) Three parts to the promise a. I will bless you into a Great Nation.
 - b. You will be a blessing which will make your name great.
 - c. All people on earth will be blessed through you.






- * Abraham has been given the <u>promise</u>, but he doesn't understand how <u>powerful</u> God is!
- 3. Abram tests the promise three Times.
- a. Abraham lies to Pharaoh to save himself. God re-promises Abraham.
- b. Abraham <u>sleeps</u> with Hagar to have a son. God re-promises Abraham.
- c. Abraham lies to <u>Abimelech</u> to save himself. God blesses Abraham with the birth of Isaac.

Finally, after <u>15</u> years – Abraham is ready, and God <u>tests</u> him

d. God tells Abraham to <u>sacrifice</u> Isaac. God provides a <u>lamb</u>.





Genesis 22:16-18 – God Repeats His Promise

¹⁶"I swear by myself, declares the LORD, that because you have done this and have not withheld your son, your only son, ¹⁷I will surely <u>bless you</u> and <u>make your descendants as numerous</u> as the stars in the sky and as the sand on the seashore. Your descendants will take possession of the cities of their enemies, ¹⁸and through your offspring <u>all nations on earth will be blessed</u>, because you have obeyed me."

Genesis 22:16-18



- 4. Gen 26 The call of Isaac (Gen 26:1-5) three parts to God's promise to Isaac
 - a. Bless you & descendants with land.(vs. 2-3)
 - b. Make your descendants <u>numerous</u>.
 - c. All <u>nations</u> on earth will be <u>blessed</u> through you.
- 5. Gen 27 The blessing passed to Jacob
 - a. Promise passed by <u>Isaac</u>. (Gen 27:28-29)
 - b. Success confirmed by God. (Gen 32:28)
 - "Jacob" becomes "Israel" → Struggles with God
 - c. Promise confirmed by God. (Gen 46:1-4)



- 6. The Story of Joseph (Genesis 37-50)
 - * Joseph Get's It WHAT GOD SAYS MATTERS MOST
 - a. Jealous brothers sell him to Egyptian slave traders. (Gen. 37:12-36)
 - b. Slave to Potiphar, captain of Pharaoh's guard. (Gen. 39)
 - c. Potiphar's wife gets him in trouble for not sleeping with her.
 - d. Interprets Pharaoh's dream, becomes 2nd highest in Egypt. (Gen. 41)
 - e. Organizes Egyptian <u>famine</u> relief. (Gen. 41:41-57)
 - f. Brothers come to Egypt for help. (Gen. 42)
 - g. Moves <u>family</u> to Egypt where they will live <u>430</u> years. (Gen. 46-50)





Conclusions for Genesis

- a. In Genesis, God outlined His plan and His promise for all humanity.
 - His plan: to form a people in His image with whom He can relate by bringing <u>order</u> from <u>chaos</u>.
 - His promise: to build a family, a people, and a nation through Abraham to bless the world.
- b. The events in Genesis demonstrate that God protects His plan at all costs.
- c. God proved that He is patient and forgiving towards those who want to conform to His <u>plan</u> and join His <u>Mission</u>.
